Analysis	To be able to write an analysis involves an explanation of why something is important and what impact it has in the short and or long term			
Credibility	Similar to reliability; can you trust someone or something to reveal the facts or as much of the accurate story as possible?			
Emphasis	If something emphasises something it chooses to focus on it above other things.			
Evaluation	Evaluation is the ability to reach an informed judgment about the value of a source to your historical topic.			
Infer	An inference is an educated conclusion you can make from sources/evidence using your own knowledge and reasoning.			
Interpretation	A historian's point of view and explanation of past events. They use different sources and choose to emphasise different things. They have spent many years researching topics to come to their conclusions.			
Nature	What type of source it is; newspaper, diary entry, interview, photograph, report etc and how this might affect what is written/said and what is and is not included			
Origin	Who made a source and when			
Provenance	The background of the source, its nature, origin and purpose
